Program

Rick Stille, **Wendy Spurgeon's** guest and treasurer of SPIN (Supporting People In Need), introduced Barbara Mora. SPIN has been a non-profit for the past 2 years and have 9 people on the board and one part-time paid employee.

SPIN has been addressing the needs of the homeless in Grant County, primarily their housing needs, especially with those who have the most difficulty transferring out of homelessness. There are lots of reasons for this difficulty, such as mental illness, chronic anxiety, bipolar, and depression. Grant County does not currently have programs to address these needs. SPIN also has veterans and others with PTSD or some cognitive impairment with no family support.

Each are individuals with a name and story. SPIN wants to help, not change them. Housing is the first requirement, as all else requires an address, such as jobs.

Homelessness is more prevalent all the time. SPIN has 2 main projects: one is operational now, which is transitional housing. They rent a space and are looking to purchase the building. They take in a small number of men to share the house, 4 at a time with constant supervision mostly. The men are vetted, so it is not just an open-door home. It is a sober environment with supportive care on site. It has been operational for a year, and SPIN has had success getting them jobs and getting their identity back. Once a man has an address, he can apply for resources like food stamps. There is a long waiting list for the house. SPIN looks at men that have been in jail for non-violent crime. Most homeless are paralyzed by their circumstances and that they are not a part of the community.

SPIN does try to find family members, but some men have burned bridges or have been in foster care their whole lives.

The other big project that SPIN has is permanent housing for those that have chronic needs that will always need help. It is for single men, women, families, and such. There are roughly 100 homeless children in Grant County; they are often couch surfing with other families. The unrest leads to great

stress and contributes to the fear and instability. The permanent housing will be a facility that is built. SPIN has put in an application with the city to donate the land and are waiting; they plan to build 24 units and have onsite help. It will not be a shelter or soup kitchen but a permanent housing situation.

SPIN operates under the umbrella of NM Coalition to eradicate homelessness and operates by those guidelines. How will it be paid for: SPIN is 1 of 8 groups in NM working on this type of project. The men don't have to clean up first; they take care of housing, then work to help them with addictions.

A success story is Community of Hope in Mesilla. That house serves 50 people and started in 1993.

SPIN has tax credits and grants to help with cost, but they could use other gifts and peer support. Come by and bring food! Nothing is wasted.

These services are cost-effective for the county; otherwise these homeless people stay in jails, hospitals, and such. In Grant county the number of homeless is fluid and usually in a PIT count (point-in-time count). The speaker doesn't have a number, but it involves more men than women and from aged early adulthood to the elderly. There are also near-homeless people who have lost jobs and can't pay their bills and barely hanging on.

Spread the word! SPIN is a volunteer organization with only 1 part-time paid person.
